

"I want the USCIS to have the resources it needs to carry out its mission, but we want to encourage immigrants to become U.S. citizens rather than putting up barriers to the process," Pastor said Wednesday. "I worry these fees will be too prohibitive for immigrants who want to become Americans. I plan to carefully examine this proposal to ensure that any changes made are fair and reasonable."

The cost for applying for naturalization, for example, would increase to \$595 from \$330, an add on of more than 80 percent. The required fingerprint check would go up to \$80 from \$70.

A proposed rule on the fee adjustments will be published in the Federal Register on Feb. 1. It provides for a 60-day public comment period. Written comments may be submitted by:
